REFLECTION - TAKE UP YOUR CROSS, LENT 2

In the Christian year there are several feasts of the cross, all of which commemorate the cross used in the crucifixion of Jesus. The most likely to come to mind is Good Friday which is dedicated to the passion of Christ. The others celebrate the cross itself as a sign of salvation, the most well known in Anglican terms being Holy Cross day which is celebrated on 14^{th} September.

The gospel reading from last Sunday was from Mark chapter 8, the way of the cross:

"If anyone would come after me, he must deny himself and take up his cross and follow me. For whoever wants to save his life will lose it, but whoever loses his life for me and for the gospel, will save it".

In the Jewish homeland in the first century, taking up one's cross was an image of death. It did not yet mean patiently bearing whatever burdens might befall one as when we sometimes think of "our cross in life" as a physical difficulty or as a troublesome in-law. Rather taking up one's cross referred to the Roman practice of requiring a person condemned to crucifixion to carry a horizontal crossbeam to the place of execution, where the vertical post was permanently fixed in the ground. To take up one's cross was to embark upon the path to death.

Such a decision is a personal one. A good example here would-be Maximilian Kolbe who volunteered to die in the place of a stranger in Auschwitz, or of indeed Archbishop Romero who spoke out against poverty social injustice and torture knowing that his actions would lead to his assassination, which was duly carried out by a death squad in El Salvador in March 1980.

In both cases an inner conviction of faith prevailed over the evil of the outer world.

If you take a walk along parts of what once was the Berlin Wall, you will discover 130 crosses commemorating those who were killed by East German border guards as they attempted to escape to the west death was not inevitable, but the possibility must have weighed heavily upon them before the attempts were made. For them inner freedom was of paramount importance.

These examples show how individuals have undertaken a conscious decision that led to their death. For Maximilian Kolbe and Archbishop Romero they were following in the footsteps of Christ. The cross for us has become a symbol of the death and resurrection of Jesus and is at the centre of our Christian belief.

Finally, may we reflect on those who have died in the past year from COVID-19. Theirs was not a deliberate choice as a way of death. However, the grief and anguish caused by their departing has shaken our belief, as we thought that such pandemics were a thing of the past. It has made us look again at our inner selves in the midst of the Outer World.

A Spiritual Communion

We remain united as the body of Christ even when we cannot meet together and share in the normal life of the Church. Throughout Christian history some Christian people have found themselves isolated from the sacramental life of the Church for all sorts of reasons. At such times the Church has encouraged people to make what is called a Spiritual Communion. It is a way of uniting yourself with Jesus and entering into communion with him even though you are not able to receive the sacrament itself.

You may find it helpful to use the following prayers, either as part of the live-streamed worship from Church, or at a separate time. You may wish to begin by lighting a candle or sitting in a special place. You may wish to read and reflect on the readings for Holy Communion on Sunday, which you can find on the weekly news sheet.

Jesus said, 'I am the bread of life. Whoever comes to me will never be hungry, and whoever believes in me will never be thirsty.' John 6.35

Spend some time in prayer; for the needs of the world, for your local community, and for those close to you, ending with the Lord's Prayer.

Give thanks for the saving death and resurrection of Jesus and ask him to be with you now.

O loving God, in union with Christian people throughout the world and across the centuries who have gathered to give thanks, to hear your holy Word and receive the precious Body and Blood of your dear Son, I offer you praise and thanksgiving. Even though I am exiled from tasting the Bread of Heaven and drinking the Cup of Life I pray that you will unite me with all the baptised and with your Son who gave his life for us. Come Lord Jesus, dwell in me and send your Holy Spirit that I may be filled with your presence. Amen

You might then add one or more of the following prayers:

Lord Jesus Christ, you said to your disciples, 'I am with you always'.

Be with me today, as I offer myself to you. Hear my prayers for others and for myself, and keep me in your care. Amen.

Lord, in these days of mercy, make us quiet and prayerful;

in these days of challenge, make us stronger in you;

in these days of emptiness, take possession of us;

Conclude with the following:

The Lord bless us, and preserve us from all evil, and keep us in eternal life. Amen.
