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

This experience is designed for primary school children predominantly although it was also enjoyed by many adult visitors. Created a few years ago by Canon Grant, it takes you on a journey which begins on Advent Sunday taking in the festivals of Christmas and Epiphany, through the baptism of Jesus and His earthly ministry before turning your attention toward Lent, Holy Week and Easter. The trail reaches its finale with the story of the Ascension and the festival of Pentecost.

This learning opportunity is especially valuable for those who have little knowledge of the Christian faith and many local schools brought classes into All Saints to support the religious learning of their pupils.

I would like to take this opportunity to thank so many of you who helped to make this happen. With a project of this size there is a tremendous amount of work to do in setting up, guiding the children around and getting the church back together again for the Sunday Services. To all of you who contributed, you really are appreciated and the feedback received from the town schools is confirmation of just how valuable this facility is to so many people.

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

RSCM Music Sunday - 12th June 2022

Here's an extract from the Royal School of Church Music website about the RSCM Music Sunday in 2020:



"This year our annual event to celebrate the powerful role of music in Christian worship, Music Sunday, is on 14 June 2020.


Churches up and down the land, whether RSCM Members or not, were encouraged to take part in this international celebration of the role music plays in the life of Christian worship.

In the words of composer John Rutter, a fellow of the RSCM and supporter of RSCM Music Sunday: 'Music spreads joy, something in short supply in our national life at the moment'.

This year we have commissioned Thomas Hewitt Jones to compose an anthem especially for the event. He has set to music 'Hymns and Psalms and Sacred Songs', words written by Timothy Dudley-Smith, the leading hymn writer. It is based on passages from Ephesians and Colossians, and refers to singing in the early church, and to Paul's commendation that these local fellowships should sing when they met for worship.

Hugh Morris, Director of the RSCM, explains the thinking behind RSCM Music Sunday 2020: 'Music Sunday is an opportunity to shine a spotlight on the way music is used in worship, and to celebrate the contribution of the many who lead and perform it. Whilst that of course includes choirs, and our choral heritage is something we celebrate, music in worship encompasses a diverse range of styles and forms, and we want to support these, too'."

This year, RSCM Music Sunday falls on 12th June. I had a listen to the Hewitt Jones piece and, it's only my opinion, but I found it just a little tedious. So to celebrate Music Sunday this year, I have decided to resurrect one of the pieces which the choir learned from scratch during lockdown. It's the last movement from Ralph Vaughan-Williams's 5 Mystical songs named "Antiphon" – "Let all the world in every corner sing."



If you are in church to hear it, I hope you will listen carefully to the organ part, which is not at all easy to play. Good job Sam (our Organ Scholar) enjoys a challenge!

Last year as we began to emerge from lockdown in July I wanted to offer something to start rebuilding a sense of community and hope for the future. I normally spend the August bank holiday weekend with clergy and other friends at Greenbelt festival and so I asked my friends to help me offer a slice of that festival experience at All Saints instead.

This year we are repeating the event, but we wanted to hold it within term time so we chose a weekend in June and set about planning. I am delighted that we have a wide range of events and activities again. There will be trails and activities running for children on Saturday and Sunday and lots for people of all ages to join in with. Admission is free and refreshments at the café & the BBQ on Sunday will be available to purchase. I also hope that those who attend will give generously to support the event.

Saturday will include talks and panel discussions exploring themes such as music, poetry and craft and an interactive session on prayer. On Sunday we will have one service at 10am, a BBQ lunch and music from some of our talented local children, a Conversation Café at 4pm and at 6pm our own Songs of Praise evensong.

The highlights this year will be on Saturday morning at 11am when Rev'd Dr. Mark Oakley, Dean of St John's College Cambridge and author of several books including "A Splash of Words: Believing in Poetry", will talk to us about poetry, faith and language.



Then on Sunday at 2pm we have The Underground Clown Club performing "Love and Rabbits". Two fools take to the stage to lead you on a poetic journey through the most surreal, silly and forgotten parts of your imagination. I love this show that will delight and entertain all ages. Last year some of you will remember Katie Overstall giving us a one woman version of the show.

I'm delighted that this year she will be joined by Andrew Skipper.

Around the Ouzel Valley Team

Eight churches, each special in their own way, but all being Christian witness to the whole community of Leighton Linslade

Our aim as members of this small church has been to bring out the beauty of this lovely building for the benefit of passers-by, whether villagers or visitors to the area. Its simple design makes it easy to maintain. The grounds on the other hand are rather more challenging. Hedges overgrown with ivy, starved of nutrients by the giant Leylandii and needing a good trim are slowly taking shape with new hedging and regular care.



Our gardener Phil is keeping the grass in check with a weekly mow in the summer, keeping it to a minimum to allow native plants to flourish and the wildflowers sowed last year are beginning to appear. We have regular visitors to the garden at the back which include those with four legs as well as the two legged variety, and a resident robin called Robin who sings whenever the sun shines. *Left:* Father Noel holds our Tuesday evening service outside in the long summer evenings and somehow it holds its solemnity and adds a large helping of joy.

The large iron gate has been removed and a bower of passion flower is being established to welcome people in rather than keeping them out. *Right*: Our dedicated team of artists is creating some colour to bring our shed in as part of the nature in the garden

We were delighted to accommodate the Pilgrims to the COP meeting held in Glasgow in October last year. They were foot-weary and tired but happy, we had an enjoyable evening of song and debate before bidding them goodnight. Liberation - I wonder, does it hold any specific significance for you? The Oxford English Dictionary defines 'liberated' as 'being freed, released, including being released from occupation or subjugation by a foreign power'. My, there seems to be a constant need for liberation of some sort or other.

Recently I was aboard a pristine, open-top, vintage, military vehicle during the Liberation Day cavalcade on the island of Guernsey. You know what they say: 'it's not what you know......'

I was dressed in overalls and very pleased no-one asked me to fix their truck. However my driver and co-passengers were dressed in original service uniforms, complete with the uniform provenance tucked in the top pockets. One wonders what was going through the original owner's mind on May 9th, 1945. I doubt it was 'I hope someone is wearing this uniform in 77 years' time'!

The cavalcade of around 100 military and vintage vehicles passed through all 10 parishes covering over 30 miles. The streets were lined with residents and visitors. There was a lot of flag waving and good cheer and the day culminated with fireworks over Castle Cornet in St Peter Port. May 9th is a public holiday in Guernsey - whatever day it falls on. Next year it is a Tuesday.

Needless to say this unique experience got me thinking about liberation. Guernsey's annual celebrations of its liberation from German occupation in 1945 are huge. I hope we can all reflect on our own moments of liberation - it comes in all shapes and sizes. As for celebrating, well, you are free to choose.

The recent plant sale and teas held in the beautiful church garden and village hall raised almost £700 for St Michael's. Another well attended event full of good cheer and well-organised. No flags. I am not sure the courgette plant that returned home with me is going to feel hugely liberated when I plant it in my clay soil.



... Unexpected Places by Rev'd Steve Marsh

A series exploring some of the ways we encounter God in the world and in our lives.

I was reading an article recently in which the songwriter Nick Cave was explaining how he used to have a designated sacred space in his home. Whilst this had been a beneficial creative and spiritual space for him, a change in circumstance meant he had to give it up. He felt anxious about doing this, but much to his surprise, he felt freed and liberated by this release. Nick realised that his previous sacred space, whilst a place of many positive encounters in his spirituality and creativity, had become a place where he was locking out the world, a place of hiding and exclusion.

Nick did not create a new sacred space and instead decided that he desired his next spiritual encounters to be had through engagement rather than hiding, inclusion rather than exclusion. Nick explained how his new sacred space became the world around him and the people he engaged with. Nick wrote about how this shift completely blew open his understanding of what is a sacred space. He concluded the article:

'Perhaps, the sacred space is simply the world itself – a hallowed place where we all exist at this time, where we engage with life in all its many tempers, within the present moment. Perhaps the thing we have spent so much time escaping, or attempting to create, was there all along – the blessed space, the sacred space, the truly creative place – the world around us.'^(A)

Our church buildings, our sacred spaces, are great places of encounter with God. If our church building is very old, it is inspiring to think of the generations of Christians worshiping in the same space we inhabit today, connecting us with a rich faith heritage. The beauty of the architecture, artefacts and art in our church buildings can be very conducive to enabling us to encounter God.

However, God does not exclusively reside in our church buildings; God is not solely contained within. An encounter with God is not only available if we visit one of these faith houses. As our creator God, the whole of his creation speaks of his presence and offers an opportunity for encounter with him.

It is very noteworthy that after his resurrection Jesus does not reconnect with his bewildered disciples in the temple or in the synagogues. Instead he goes and meets them where they are: walking alongside the two disciples on the road to Emmaus; cooking fish on the shore for a morning breakfast for the disciples who are returning from fishing. The disciples encounter the risen Jesus where they are in their normal lives.

Then in Jesus' great commission to his disciples, which includes us today, Jesus commands his disciples to 'Go and make disciples of all nations, baptising them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit'. Jesus does not say, 'Stay in and wait for people to come to you'. He says 'Go. And enable people to encounter God where they are'.

As you may have read in the articles that Jo [Bellamy] so thoughtfully writes on behalf of the Church of the Good Shepherd (CGS) for Saints Alive, CGS has recently moved. Many parents would say to us we cannot come to your gathering on a Sunday morning because our child is at football training or matches. This led us at CGG to think, well rather than inviting these families to join us, let's 'go' and join them. CGS now meets in Astral Park Sports and Community Centre next to the football pitches. We have a pop-up café outside to serve the football parents refreshments whilst they are watching their children play in the matches. Through this move to 'go' we have encountered many people we previously had no contact with. In chatting with parents over a drink and a pastry we have also had many faith focused conversations that have enabled an encounter with God for the parents and us.

Returning to Nick Cave, he has written a very poignant song called 'God is in the House'. In the song he questions the supposed security people derive from the comfort that 'God is in the House', in their church. Nick Cave writes:

Our town is very pretty.
We have a pretty little square.
We have a woman for a mayor.
Our policy is firm but fair.
And no one's left in doubt,
God is in the house.

However, he then goes on to question, to make a plea:

There's no fear about.

If we all hold hands and very quietly shout,

'Hallelujah. God is in the house.

Oh, I wish He would come out.'

Our churches are great sacred spaces where people can encounter God. However, if people see our churches as places where God is contained and not available for them, and don't feel that God is interested in coming out to encounter them where they are, then maybe we have some work to do.

Like Nick Cave reviewing his sacred space, reflecting on whether it was a place of hiding rather than engagement, exclusion rather than inclusion, maybe we could benefit from reviewing our attitudes to what constitutes a sacred space. Such a review could result in us letting 'God come out', letting ourselves 'come out' and 'go' to enable people, all created in the image of God, to encounter their creator God, wherever they happen to be in his creation.



Reduce, Reuse, Recycle A guide for parents



The argument for limiting use of disposables in all areas of life is very strong, even for biodegradable items. Every time you make a choice to avoid using a disposable item you are making a positive difference to our world. So how can parents limit their impact on the environment?

NAPPIES



Each year, parents throw away around three billion disposable nappies to landfill. Did you know that disposable nappies take up to 500 years to decompose; and by the time a baby is potty-trained you could use between 4,000 and 6,000?

In comparison, a baby only needs around 20 to 30 modern reusable nappies, some of which use recycled materials. Forget the need to learn towel origami, some nappies come as "all in one" ready to velcro in place, just like a disposable. If you have a washing machine and a place to dry laundry, reusable nappies can save between £200 and £500 over the 2.5 years that your baby is likely to use them. Although the cost of reusable nappies is paid upfront, rather than little weekly installments for disposables, this can be reduced by a local authority grant offered by CBC. It is estimated that by using reusable nappies rather than disposables, the average household waste of families with babies can be halved. This waste reduction will have associated cost savings for the local authority. The financial benefit of reusable nappies will be increased if used for more than one baby, or if bought second hand, and then sold on after use.

Let's be realistic about this. There will be times when disposables are used; when on holiday, or just because you have failed to do the laundry. Even if you only ever manage to try one reusable nappy that's one less nappy in a landfill site.



WIPES - an easy switch to try with little costs to get started.

While wet wipes have become an increasingly commonplace part of our daily lives they present huge problems to the world. Wet wipes being

flushed down the toilet is the single biggest cause of sewer blockages (up to 93%). Whilst this can be avoided by binning rather than flushing, 90% of the 11 million wet wipes used in the UK every year contain plastics that turn into microplastics when broken down in landfill. These in turn contaminate water and food supplies. They can be ingested by fish and so enter the food we eat as well as cause damage to ecosystems.

Alternatives are available in the form of reusable, washable cloths, preferably made using soft natural and sustainable materials like cotton and bamboo. These have a long life and avoid the problems associated with disposable wipes and their packaging.

Reusable wipes are incredibly useful for messy jobs as you have a greater ability to scrub than with a disposable wipe. When coupled with reusable nappies they require minimal effort to wash and they come out of the machine damp and ready for use.

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
