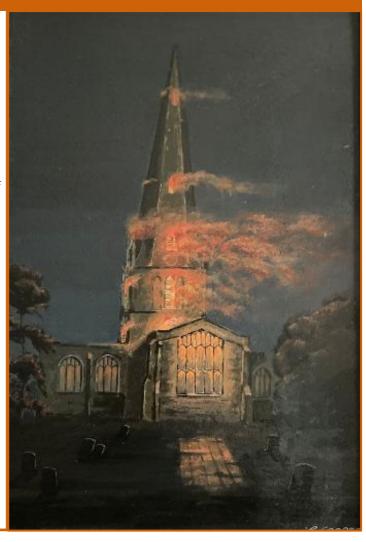

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Laughter: The Universal Language of Joy By Rev'd Noel McGeeney

Laughter is one of the simplest yet most profound expressions of our shared humanity. It cuts across language barriers, social divisions, and cultural boundaries, uniting people in moments of joy, relief, or even nervousness. Whether it bursts forth as a belly laugh or escapes as a quiet chuckle, laughter is more than a reaction—it is a gift with remarkable power.

Whenever I was abroad, I would call my parents say something funny just to hear my mother laugh. It kept me going till the next time I called.

Scientists tell us that laughter does more than lighten our mood. When we laugh, our brains release endorphins, the "feel-good" chemicals that reduce stress and foster happiness. Laughter also improves blood circulation, strengthens the immune system, and relaxes muscles. In fact, just a few minutes of genuine laughter can leave the body relaxed for up to 45 minutes afterwards. It's no wonder some call laughter "internal jogging."

Beyond physical health, laughter plays an essential role in human connection. We tend to laugh more in groups than when we are alone, suggesting that laughter evolved as a social signal—a way of strengthening bonds and easing tension. I came out of a cinema one time and I heard a couple behind me say, "there is the fella doing all the laughing". Shared laughter builds trust and reminds us that we are not alone, even in challenging times. Think about how an inside joke can unite friends, or how a child's giggle can draw strangers into shared delight. Fydor Dostoevsky said "if you wish to glimpse inside a human soul and get to know a person, just watch them laugh. If they laugh well they are a good person".

Laughter also holds profound psychological benefits. Humour helps people cope with adversity by reframing painful situations and allowing room for perspective. Hospitals and therapy centres are increasingly turning to laughter therapy and clown doctors to ease patients' stress and encourage healing. It is not a cure in itself, but it often provides the hope and positivity that treatment alone cannot deliver.

Of course, laughter is not always innocent. It can sometimes be wielded as a weapon—mockery, sarcasm, or exclusionary humour remind us that laughter has a shadow side. Yet even here lies a lesson: the most uplifting laughter is that which is shared, not at someone's expense but in celebration of life itself.

In our fast-paced, stressful world, it is easy to take life too seriously. But laughter reminds us to pause, breathe, and embrace joy. It is free, contagious, and endlessly renewable. As comedian Charlie Chaplin once said, "A day without laughter is a day wasted." Perhaps the best prescription we can all take to heart is simple: laugh more, live better. Perhaps we can also say, laughter is a renewable energy!

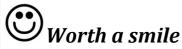

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The Power of Inspiration: A Parent and Governor's Reflection



As both a parent and a school governor, I've had the privilege of witnessing many moments of growth and transformation in our children. But few have struck me as deeply as the immediate impact of one author and illustrator's visit, Peter Brown, on my child and hopefully other Pulford children also.

It was a typical Tuesday afternoon when the children gathered in the hall, buzzing with anticipation. The visiting author—warm, engaging, and full of stories—introduced his book, "The Wild Robot", and spoke of imagination, perseverance, and the joy of creating something from nothing. My daughter came home that day with a spark in her eyes and a notebook clutched tightly in her hands.

"I'm going to write a story," she declared. And she did.

Over the next hour, I watched her pour herself into her writing and drawings. Her story was simple yet inviting, mirroring the story plot that she'd been inspired by earlier. It was filled with characters and pictures that leapt off the page and included similes and metaphors that teachers would be proud of! But more than the story itself, it was the process that moved me—the way she believed in her own voice, the way she saw herself not just as a reader, but as a creator.

As a governor, I often think about the metrics - attendance, attainment, progress. But this moment reminded me of something deeper: the immeasurable value of inspiration. Peter Brown didn't just deliver a talk; he planted seeds. Seeds of confidence, creativity, and courage.

Inspiration is a sacred gift. It's what moves us to act, to dream, to become. And in a faith community, we understand its divine nature. Just as scripture inspires us to live with purpose and compassion, so too can a story inspire a child to discover their own.

I'm grateful to our school and Tring Bookshop for making space for these moments. And I'm grateful to that author - for reminding us that sometimes, all it takes is one voice to awaken another.

So I'll leave you with these thoughts: Who are you going to inspire today and from whom are you going to take your inspiration? Creativity has endless possibilities.

I pray that I will be faithful to my promise and would encourage anyone feeling that they may be drawn to a licensed role, whether that be Reader or clergy, to have the conversation with their incumbent.

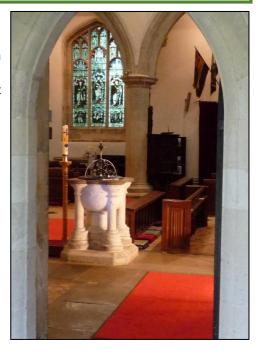


The Growing Church

As you enter All Saints through the North door, the first thing you see is the font. It was put in its present position in 2005, but in its long life of nearly 1000 years, it has stood at the west end of the nave – when the West door was in regular use; and in the south transept, a traditional place for a baptistry. Today, baptisms are popular family occasions, so to help all to see, it was carefully moved into this more prominent position. The main entrance to the church is a fitting place – baptism symbolises the beginning of the Christian journey, the entry of a new member into the church family.

Our font is from the earlier church on this site, although its metal plug is more modern, dated only 1630. It's amazing to think just how many people have been baptised in it in during the last 1000 years.





All Saints welcomes all babies, children and families for baptism, whatever shape that family takes. Baptism is the amazing start of a journey of faith for you and your child and a special day for all your family and friends.

It is a celebration where parents and Godparents make promises to raise a child in the Christian faith.

Adults being baptised make these commitments themselves. You do not have to be baptised yourself or a regular church goer to have your child baptised.

A series looking at youth work in our churches. This month: Baptism

The Baptism team at All Saints consists of 4 volunteers who welcome and prepare families for their child's baptism. Every family is invited to a Baptism Preparation evening, during which we show a short presentation explaining about the baptism service and outline the various services and groups that are available. This is an opportunity to book a date for the service, to ask questions and to look around the church, especially for newcomers. (Baptism Services at All Saints take place on a Sunday morning at 11.30am with up to three baptism families at each service.)



Families are invited to attend two church services: the first before baptism, for a Thanksgiving. Prayers are said for the child being baptised and their family and they are given a book with a bible story in. The second service is after the baptism when the newly baptised child is welcomed by the church congregation at one of our regular family services. We have 2 of these each month: Messy Mass with craft activities; and All Age Communion services. These are especially popular with young families and will help you explore faith and make new friends.







During the baptism, water is blessed in the font and poured over the candidate, symbolising cleansing from sin and spiritual rebirth in the name of the Father, Son and Holy Spirit. Towards the end of the service the newly baptised child or adult is presented with a lighted candle which represents the light of Christ. On the first anniversary of the baptism each child receives a baptism anniversary card. If you, or anyone you know is thinking about baptism please speak to any member of the clergy or contact the parish office for more details.

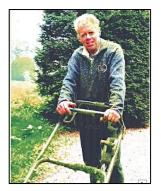

Colin Gibbs-Jones 1958 - 2025

On 1st September we received the dreadful news that Colin had died suddenly while on his way to a business appointment in London. It came as a huge shock and all his many friends and acquaintances in Billington are deeply saddened by his passing.

Colin and Tanya together with their two children, Chantal and Jason, emigrated to the UK from South Africa in 2002. They lived initially in Berkhamsted but then moved to Great Billington in 2012 where Colin's positive outlook and wish to become involved in village life made an immediate impact.



He needed to remove a tree from their new front garden and contacted me as Tree Warden at that time to check on any regulations. As they were within the conservation area, I explained that permission was needed from CBC, which Colin duly received.

However, that initial contact led to a firm and lasting friendship and we cooperated on many village volunteer projects over the years. Colin's first thought was always 'how can I help?' whenever there was a job to be done in the village. He was in the forefront of footpath tidying, community orchard tree pruning, village gates painting and grass cutting in the churchyard. He was the one who climbed the tree in the churchyard to fix Sandra Brewin's owl nesting box gift on her standing down as church warden! He also organised the village Apple Day in 2014 and put up the Village Hall Christmas tree lights each December. There was always a 'next project' on his mind, and he tried to revitalise both the village Welcome Pack and The Bugle newsletter as well as something entirely new, namely a village War Memorial and name plaque. But he couldn't do it all himself and lack of funds or support sadly ended several of his ideas.

However, he made friends all along the way and that is the important part. We will all miss him terribly; he was a wonderful husband to Tanya and father to Chantal and Jason and had so much to give them and his three grandchildren. We send them our love and sincere condolences. I regret very much not spending more time chatting with him on tales of the sea as his insights after 20 years' service with the South African Navy, in which he rose to the rank of Commander, and my own father's seagoing experiences in both World Wars would have been a fascinating topic.

Fire at All Saints:

Extracts from a personal account of the night of 13 April 1985 by Terry Warburton, churchwarden 1982-1990



This is the only known eyewitness account of that fateful night 40 years ago, written while the memory was still fresh. The cause of the fire has never been established, but criminal damage has not been ruled out.

11pm: a telephone call from the vicarage. "Come quick. The church is on fire!"

Church Square full of fire engines. Hoses criss-crossing the roadway. Flashing blue lights reflected in office windows; radios squawking; an acrid smell of burning. Spotlights illuminating the north side of the building. Fire visible through the upper windows of the vestry; smoke streaming off the vestry roof; and through the stained-glass windows at the east end, orange flames belching out of the organ up into the roof. An awesome and eerie sight.



The vicar Peter Whittaker and I stood transfixed.

The most dreadful thing imaginable was happening. Our beautiful parish church, physical and spiritual centre of the community for over 700 years, was in deep trouble. Thoughts of all the efforts put in by so many people during the last two years of restoration flashed through my mind. Also thoughts of the countless numbers of people who had loved the church and cared for it over the centuries. Was this to be the end?

The story went on – more fire engines arrived from all over the county, so many that water pressure became a problem. Showers of sparks; dense smoke; the noise of crackling, of bits crashing from the roof, of people calling for keys, doors jammed; the frustrations; the fear ...

Yellow flames streaking through broken glass, fanned to enormous ferocity by the wind. Flames sharp, roaring in the wind, turning from orange to bright blue in the lantern windows at the top of the spire, nearly 190 feet up. Smoke streaming the full length of the spire, silhouetted by the fire brigade's searchlights ... it looked like a veil on a medieval lady's hat ...

The organ a ball of fire.

Water everywhere.

We watched in horror.

I spoke to a group of firemen:

"We must save the silver, the records, the 13th century eagle lectern."

A fireman with breathing apparatus said he would look for it. (Church Surveyor Paul Reynolds slipped in and carried the eagle out, unscathed — an astonishing feat in those conditions.)

I rescued armfuls of silver, records, documents ... borrowed a fireman's helmet and looked into the chancel ... saw ribbons of glowing embers, the choir organ gone, stalactites of molten metal hanging from its remains. Through the steam and streaming water, the Easter flowers still under the high altar.

The bells, clock, organ, much of the chancel roof were lost. Paul Reynolds was working out the danger zone if the spire were to fall.

We just stood and stared.

Churchwarden Jean Rumbelow dispensed tea.

I cannot describe the despair I felt.







By daylight, the fire had spent its force, exhausting itself in fury in the spire. Salvage could start — anything portable was rescued and carried to the vicarage which looked like a religious jumble sale — piles of robes, music, silver; the vicar's carpets thick with walked-in charcoal and mud.

Back in the Square, a policeman said: "my children were christened here. I hope you will re-build it as it was, and not put up a modern building."

A resolve was formed that night. All Saints would be rebuilt, to the glory of God, and to the best of our abilities.

It was re-hallowed on 7th May 1989. In his sermon at the reconsecration service the Bishop of St Albans, John Taylor, said this:

"This restored building will be for many a sermon in stone. Cherish it. Use it well. Visit it often. And keep going out of it, to be the pilgrim Church, the witnessing Church, the triumphant Church."

Despite the devastation and loss, much did survive – the 13C eagle lectern, complete with chain; the 14C misericords; Alice de la Pole's 15C roof with angels; the 17C Wilkes pulpit; 19C Kempe windows; medieval graffiti on the pillars.

What was lost or damaged was repaired or replaced. Bright and shiny angels, new organ, new clock, new ring of 12 bells, (with a 13th 'sharp second') to join the surviving 12C 'ting-tang' Sanctus bell ...





While this is Terry's story of that night, a whole team of dedicated, devoted, determined people was involved in the rebuilding process: Peter Whittaker, Paul Reynolds, Jimmie Honour, so many more, too many to name here. They shared the vision, and the work, to bring this tragedy to a happy conclusion. The post-fire restoration is only one chapter in a long story. A 2-year restoration programme had been finished just weeks before the fire; and 10 years later, serious structural faults were found in the tower, giving rise to yet another, even bigger, programme of repair. Through all this, opportunities have been seized, not only to repair and restore, but to improve adding meeting rooms, offices, toilets, and the coffee shop – valuable space for outreach.

2 years hence, in 2027, we will mark 750 years since the foundation stone was laid. In those 750 years, needs have changed, new congregations have dreamt ... it will continue.

Living God's Love

A series exploring the St. Alban's Diocese Vision Statement This month:

"Send us" By Geoff Marchant

This is the penultimate article in our series reflecting on the prayer that supports our Diocesan vision of 'Living God's Love'. We pray this prayer to seek God's help as followers of Jesus to go *deeper* into God, *transform* the communities in which our churches are situated and *make* new disciples. This 'threefold' thread running through this vision requires our action and for me this is encapsulated in the fact that we are people who have been 'sent'. We have responded to God's calling, so we pray for his help to 'send us'. Our sending is God's graceful commission to our calling. As we are sent, we are therefore on a journey as 21st century disciples of Jesus Christ - special – because the same God who calls us, sends us.

In the words of the Nicene Creed which we affirm afresh during our worship each Sunday, we proclaim our faith including the following words: 'We believe in one holy catholic and apostolic church.' *Catholic* is literally a term from the Greek word meaning universal or worldwide. *Apostolic* (*apostle*) is derived from the Greek term 'apostolos', an apostle is basically a 'sent one', as we understand the twelve apostles commissioned at Pentecost.

The church is for all. We are entrusted with the faith passed onto us from the apostles, those disciples of Jesus that he sent out to be the first missionaries. We stand, then, in a long lineage, one that began when Jesus gathered his first disciples and continues right up to today. We stand with all those who, through two thousand years, have heard Jesus' words and tried to understand them and apply them in their own time.

It is clear then that God does not grow his Kingdom on earth by sending letters, emails or text messages. He sends followers of his Son, Jesus Christ, who have through faith accepted his calling. He has sent us - the Ouzel Valley Team, part of the Diocese of St. Albans, one cog in a wheel that is the great universal church of God.

We actually pray in this prayer for God to: 'send us to care and serve'. We are acting for a compassionate God whose Son Jesus Christ came to serve, not to be served. I mentioned earlier that being a people sent requires our action. Ours then are the feet that follow in the footsteps of Jesus. So also, ours are the hands that greet those we meet during our daily lives out in the community; the lips that share the Good News stories; the eyes and ears that sense where God's kingdom needs growing; the hearts and minds that have that same mind that was at work in Jesus Christ.

There are several derivatives of the word 'send' in the Bible which characterize how the Church is founded on people of God being sent. Each of the four gospels have what we might call 'hinge' points which provide scriptural evidence of being sent – God's mission in action.

Let's just look at these:

Firstly, right at the end of Matthew's gospel: 'Now the eleven disciples [Judas had earlier betrayed Jesus] went to Galilee, to the mountain to which Jesus had directed them.' Jesus says to them: "Go therefore and make disciples of all nations..."'. Matthew is unique in relating this story of Jesus sending out the disciples. [Matthew 28. 16,19]

Turning to Mark's gospel, right at the beginning, we read 'The beginning of the good news of Jesus Christ, the Son of God. As it is written in the prophet Isaiah, 'See, I am sending my messenger ahead of you, who will prepare your way; the voice of one crying out in the wilderness: "Prepare the way of the Lord, make his paths straight,"'.

[Mark 1. 1, 2]

Here we have the link of the Old and New Testaments. In Isaiah 40.3, Isaiah prophesies that God is sending his messenger John the Baptist. This is affirmed in the opening 'Prologue' to John's gospel: "There was a man sent from God, whose name was John." [John 1. 6]

At the beginning of Jesus' public ministry, Luke tells us of Jesus going to the synagogue in Nazareth. Jesus stands up to read. "The Spirit of the Lord is upon me, because he has anointed me to bring good news to the poor. He has sent me to proclaim release to the captives and recovery of sight to the blind, to let the oppressed go free, to proclaim the year of the Lord's favour." [Luke 4. 18]

Unique to John's gospel, we read about the first appearance of the risen Jesus to the disciples in the upper room. "Jesus said to them again, 'Peace be with you. As the Father has sent me, so I send you." [John 20. 21]

Earlier in his gospel, John records the solemn prayer that Jesus makes to his Father for his disciples during the Last Supper: "As you have sent me into the world, so I have sent them into the world. As you, Father, are in me and I am in you, may they also be in us, so that the world may believe that you have sent me." [John 17. 18, 21]

I want to close by sharing the following words from the post communion hymn by Omer Westendorf (b. 1916). They speak fittingly of a Living God who sends us:

Sent forth by God's blessing, our true faith confessing,

the people of God from his dwelling take leave.

The supper is ended: O now be extended

the fruits of his service in all who believe.

The seed of his teaching, our hungry souls reaching, shall blossom in action for God and for man.

His grace shall incite us, his love shall unite us

to work for his kingdom and further his plan.
