Series of Sermons during Advent - 1700 years since the first Nicene Creed

During advent we are celebrating the Nicene Creed at the 9.30am service. We welcome back Max and Kirsty, and Dave Heather and Alison Tolston are also preaching. We profess these words, sometimes so familiar that we overlook their depth and power, yet the creed is far more than a routine prayer. It is an underlying declaration of Christian belief, handed down to us from the early church councils nearly 1700 years ago.

When we recite the creed, we are not simply repeating ancient words - we are joining generations of believers who have carried the faith through persecution and challenge. We proclaim:

That God is Father, Son and Holy Spirit, three persons in one.

That Jesus truly became man, suffered, died and rose for our salvation.

That we look forward to the resurrection of the dead and the life of the world to come.

Let us say the Creed with renewed intention, allowing its words to shape our heart. May it remind us of our identity as Christians and our mission to commit to witness Christ's love in the world.

As we reflect on the Nicene Creed during Advent, consider asking yourself:

Which part speaks to me personally?

Do I believe these words deeply- or just recite them?

How might I live out this faith more boldly in my daily life?

May the Lord strengthen our faith and unite us in His truth.

Sunday 30th November The Revd Max Bayliss, Vicar, Chelsea Old Church

At the beginning of my exile from Leighton Buzzard, I went off to Queens' Cambridge where I was Chaplain, Fellow, and Tutor, and got married to Alice, whom I had met during my masters, towards the end of my time at LB. It was a marvellous job but found that I missed the glorious glimpse of parish ministry I was given at All Saints'.
