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

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Ash Wednesday and the beginning of Lent

Dear Friends,

On Ash Wednesday, we begin the sacred season of Lent. As we come forward to receive ashes on our forehead, we are marked with a powerful and humbling sign of our faith. The words spoken:

"Remember that you are dust, and to dust you shall return", or "Repent and believe in the gospel" remind us of both the fragility of human life and the enduring mercy of God.

Lent is a forty-day journey of conversion, patterned after Christ's own time of prayer and fasting in the desert. It is a season that invites us to pause, to examine our lives, and turn our hearts back to God with sincerity and trust.


Through the traditional practices of prayer, fasting, and alms giving, we are drawn more deeply into a relationship with God and with one another. Jesus reminds us in the gospels, *"when you pray, go to your inner room... When you fast... When you give alms....."*

As members of the Ouzel Valley Team ministry, we are a community and therefore do not walk the Lenten path alone. We journey together, supporting one another through shared prayer, worship and acts of charity. We encourage you to take part in the liturgies, Stations of the Cross, and opportunities for reconciliation offered during this holy season. The sacrament of reconciliation, in particular allows us to experience the truth of God's promise.

As we look towards Easter, let this season be a time of hope and renewal as Paul urges us: *"Be reconciled to God"*, reminding us that now is always the right time to begin again.

May this Ash Wednesday awaken with us a renewed desire to follow Christ more closely, to carry our crosses with faith, and a trust in the promise of new life. Let us support one another with prayer, kindness, and patience, confident that the Lord is near to the broken-hearted and that he walks with us every step of this Lenten journey.



A hymn for Transfiguration Sunday

The choir is learning a new anthem which we hope to sing at the 9.30 service on February 15th 2026, Transfiguration Sunday. *Quicumque Christum quaeritis* is by **Lassus** (1532 -1594). The text is the twelfth and last poem in the *Cathemerinon* (a book of daily hymns) of **Prudentius**, originally written in honour of the Epiphany, and will be reproduced, with an English translation, in the news sheet for Transfiguration Sunday.

Aurelius Prudentius Clemens was a Roman Christian poet, born in the Roman province of Tarraconensis (now northern Spain) in AD 348. He probably died in the Iberian Peninsula some time after AD 405, possibly around AD 413.

He practised law with some success and was twice provincial governor. Sometime in his 40s, possibly around AD 392, he retired from public life to become an ascetic, fasting until evening and abstaining entirely from animal food. He spent his time writing poems, hymns and controversial works in defence of Christianity.

The poetry of Prudentius is influenced by early Christian authors, such as Tertullian and St. Ambrose, as well as the Bible and the acts of the martyrs. His hymn *Da, puer, plectrum*, including *Corde natus ex parentis* (*Of the Father's Heart Begotten*) and the hymn for Epiphany *O sola magnarum urbium* (*Earth Has Many A Noble City*), both from the *Cathemerinon*, are still in use today.



Lassus, who composed the music for this piece, must be counted, together with Palestrina, among the most important composers of the English Renaissance period. No composer was more often published than Lassus. More than 475 prints containing his work exist, with some pieces being printed more than twenty times.

His name has many variants in different languages. In English, we tend to just call him Lassus. He was a Franco-Flemish composer, so his name is sometimes rendered as Orlande de Lassus, or Roland de Lassus, or even in its Italian form as Orlando di Lasso.

The often-repeated story that as a boy he was kidnapped three times because of the beauty of his voice has no evidence whatsoever to support it.




The Legend: St Valentine's day, 14th February, is a special day for lovers, but how did this connection come about? Its origins may well go back to a poem by Geoffrey Chaucer, *The Parliament of Fowles*. Dame Nature sees over a large flock of birds who are gathered to choose their mates. The birds have a parliamentary debate while three male eagles try to seduce a female bird. The debate is full of speeches and insults, but at the end, none of the three eagles wins the female eagle, and the dream ends welcoming the coming spring.

Chaucer says that the birds will sing for St Valentine and choose their spouse:

*"For this was on
Saint Valentine's Day,
when every fowl
comes to choose his mate.*

...

*Saint Valentine,
that are full lofty on high
Thus small fowls
sing for thy sake.
Now welcome, summer...*



Various other versions have been told about the origins of the St. Valentine tradition. The most touching is that of two young lovers, Sabinus and Serapia, whose relationship was hindered by their parents because they belonged to different religions (Christian and Pagan). They turned to Valentine, Bishop of Terni, for help and he married them. When Serapia fell ill with tuberculosis, Sabinus called St. Valentine to her deathbed. Sabinus implored the Saint to help him, telling him that he could not live without his companion.


Forgetting the many legends, what do we know about St Valentine himself?

There appear to be at least three Saints Valentine with connections to February 14th: Valentine of Rome - a priest; Valentine of Terni - a bishop; and Valentine of Africa - about whom nothing is known except that he was martyred in the Roman Province of Africa on 14th February.

Two priests, two healing miracles; both executed or buried on the Via Flaminia - although the accounts give differing dates, there is a common nucleus of facts, giving rise to the idea that maybe they are in fact a single person.

*One of many definitions of a saint:
“a holy person who knows he is a sinner
and embraces heroic suffering and joy in Christ”*

Valentine of Rome:

The Emperor Claudius had banned marriages for young men, believing that single men made better soldiers. Valentine of Rome defied this edict by secretly performing marriage ceremonies which ultimately led to his arrest.

While under house arrest guarded by a judge, he cured the judge's blind foster daughter, and convinced the whole family to be baptised. He didn't have the same success with the emperor, who convicted him and sentenced him to death and martyrdom, around AD 270.

There is an unsubstantiated tale that before his death, this Valentine wrote to the judge's daughter and signed it off with "From your Valentine".

Valentine of Terni:

The story regarding the Bishop of Terni takes place about seventy years later: Valentine was invited to Rome by the rhetorician and philosopher Crato, a teacher of Greek and Latin.

Crato had a son named Chaeremon who suffered from a physical deformity that forced him to keep his head between his knees. No doctor had managed to heal him. Crato promised Valentine half of his possessions if he healed his son. But during a long night-time conversation, Valentine explained that it would not be his useless wealth that would heal the boy, but his faith in the one true God. Valentine then prayed over the boy who regained his health. Moved by this miracle, Crato and his whole family were baptised by the bishop.



St Valentine nearer to home: There are no churches in England dedicated to Valentine, but since 1835 his relics have been claimed by the Whitefriars Carmelite church in Dublin. On Saint Valentine's Day, many individuals make a pilgrimage to the shrine to pray for happiness and true love.

It was brilliant to see everyone enjoying themselves. The hall was decorated with wonderful Christmas lights, adding to the magical atmosphere. This is the second time we have run the event in this format, which has developed out of Beer & Carols to be more family-focused.

Finally, the Midnight Communion at St Michael and All Angels, Billington, brought together members of both the CGS and St Michael's communities for a special and peaceful welcome to our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ on Christmas morning.

Christmas comes and goes quickly, but it is good to reflect on these treasured times of community celebration together. We pray that the "light in the darkness" will sustain us all as we continue through the dark winter months.

Epiphany: Light for the Journey Ahead

January often feels like a quiet in-between season. The decorations of Christmas have been packed away, and the new year stretches out before us. In the church calendar, this is no empty space. It is the Season of Epiphany—a time to notice God's light still shining, guiding us forward on our journey of faith.

During Advent, we journeyed in hope, joy and love. At St Nicholas, our milestones were the patronal supper, an evening of friendship, music and good food at the beginning of Advent, and the joyous *Carols By Candlelight* which prepared our hearts for Christ's coming. At Christmas, we celebrated the miracle of Emmanuel. Epiphany asks us to move forward, trusting in God.

The story of Epiphany centres on the Magi, who followed a star into the unknown. They, like us, did not have a detailed map, only a promise and a light to guide them. Their journey reminds us that faith often calls us to move forward with trust, even when our path is not clear. Like them, we are invited to keep walking, watching for signs of God's presence along the way.

January is a fitting time for reflection. The days are cold and the landscape may appear lifeless, but beneath the surface, change is already happening. Spring is quietly preparing to emerge. In the same way, God continues to work in us—even when growth is not immediately visible.

Epiphany encourages us to pay attention. To notice how Christ is revealed not only in grand moments, but in ordinary days. In conversations, acts of kindness, moments of prayer, God's light continues to shine. This season reminds us that Christmas was not the end of the story: it was the beginning of Christ's life and ministry that still transforms the world.

As we look ahead toward spring, Epiphany calls us to carry Christ's light forward. The journey of faith does not pause after Christmas; it deepens. We are invited to reflect on where God may be leading us in the coming months, both individually and as a church. What new life might God be growing? What steps of faith is He asking us to take?

Getting to know your clergy in a different way

"Choir Boy Stops Wedding of the Year."

These were the words on 10th February 1975 that the local newspaper sellers were calling out all over the City Centre of Birmingham: "*Choir boy stops wedding of the year.*"

It was a day implanted in my memory. I woke up early that morning very excited because I was going to have a whole day off school and be paid for the luxury of not going in. You see, I was a chorister in Birmingham Cathedral Choir at the time and we had been asked if we would sing two hymns during the pretend wedding between Noel Gordon and Hugh Mortimer. This wedding had had a lot of hype over the proceeding months because it was through the Midlands soap, 'Crossroads' where the proprietor of Crossroads Motel was to be married. This soap at the time was as popular as Coronation Street, and EastEnders still was not on our TV screens. Crossroads was on twice a week and watched by millions of viewers from all over the country.

Choir arrived at the cathedral in good time and rehearsed with the actors and actresses for what seemed like ages. We had to sing these two hymns over and over and over again. Of course, what nobody told us was that to film you had to have extra lighting. Please bear in mind that I am only 11 years old and we were not the main people of the wedding. Some of these big lights were shining brightly on me for some hours and I ended up with the most horrendous headache. This headache turned into feeling very unwell. Being very young, I didn't know how to stop them filming or tell anybody I was feeling so sick. Well, the consequences you can work out for yourselves but needless to say several choristers had to be removed as I had been physically ill! You'll only see me singing in one hymn looking very pale and not seen at all in the second one.

To this day, I have no idea how my illness had got out into the wide world and of course, because of my age, I could not be named. But my migraine somehow hit not only the local paper that night but also the local news on TV. For quite a few days people wrote letters into the local paper saying things like, I had summoned up many people's feelings in the city as the Cathedral should never have been used for a fake wedding. So you now know that if I disappear during the service, I have learnt to withdraw if I have a migraine rather than to remain and create mayhem within the service!

The second thing you may not know about me is that I was the warm-up act for Kylie Minogue when she was performing on the pyramid stage at the Glastonbury festival some years ago.

Many of you know that I was previously Vicar in Glastonbury and the question I'm often asked is, did I attend the festival? I have been very fortunate as Michael Evis was a regular attender at the church in Glastonbury as it was also the civic church. He would attend Remembrance and the Mayor's service every year. We got talking and he asked if I would wander around the festival talking to anybody who wished to talk to me over the duration of the festival. So I would happily wander around with a Glastonbury festival style hat and a suitable dog collar and shirt, obviously again Glastonbury style. The idea was that I walked around the site during the day, and in the evening, I could put my dog collar to one side and listen to any concert I wish to attend. Hardly a hardship as you can imagine. It used to take me a good three days to cover the whole site. Bear in mind, I would clock off around six in the evening each night. I have had some amazing experiences but to say that I was the warm-up for Kylie Minogue is something I'm very proud of.

A few days before the festival started Rev'd. Kate Botley, who hosts the radio 2 morning show on a Sunday came to Glastonbury with the BBC. I was interviewed by her in Glastonbury Abbey talking about the Holy Thorn. This is a tree that legend says Joseph of Arimathea planted when he came to Glastonbury. What makes this unique is that it flowers at Christmas every year but also at Easter. This makes it an extraordinary tree as Easter varies every year.

I don't know how, but we ended up talking about various acts that would be at the festival that year, and I was heard to be saying that I would be attending Stormzy who was a big noise at the time and performing on the Friday on the Pyramid stage. What I didn't know is when this would be broadcast.



So there I am amongst thousands of people around the pyramid stage waiting for Kylie to come on when I suddenly get lots of text messages from friends from all over the country saying, "Dave you're on TV with Kate and it's just before Kylie is about to come onto the telly." So you see Kylie and I have a following as millions were watching this before she came on stage. Thank you to the BBC and of course to Kylie herself!
